Dear Sultan Mohammed Didi:

I hope that you will strengthen compassionately the flickering of a faint light that I have tried to understand and reflect in my blue papers on PEACE and a Membership Agreement in a HUMAN VALUES EXCHANGE.

The impressions keep coming into my consciousness that all the peoples of the world are almost of one Mind in their hatred of war, of the burdens of war preparations and wastes, of the deceitfulness of false propaganda, and in their determination to share in a more abundant standard of living in peace and security.

The fears of the revolt of the people seem to burden all the leaders of all nations with the still unanswered questions of how to finance the projects that must provide work and abundant living to all.

The faint light that has come to me seems to say that such finance is simply a matter of trust, of confidence, of respect for law, and contracts.

There seems to be hope in the honoring by all common peoples of The United Nations' Declaration of Human Rights, and in the Nuremberg and Havana war crimes trials fixing of the individual responsibility and liability to prosecution and punishment of all the leaders who break laws or contracts, who lie, practice deceit, advocate or use force or violate human rights.

I hope that you will add your best ideas: that you and your associates will join as individuals in the HUMAN VALUES EXCHANGE; that you will cause it to provide abundantly for all your communities; that you will work for completion of enabling legislation, or treaties and contracts; and that you will create some opportunity for me to work with you and your people for peace and prosperity and freedom for every person in the world.
